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the twentieth anniversary release of a groundbreaking feminist text a powerful indictment of the current state of feminism and a passionate call to arms today people of all genders strive to uphold the goals of feminism and proudly embrace the term but the movement itself is often beset with confusion and questions does personal empowerment happen at the expense of politics is

feminism for the few or does it speak to the many as they bump up against daily injustices what does it mean to say the future is female in 2000 jennifer baumgardner and amy richards s manifesta set out to chronicle the feminism of their generation they brilliantly revealed the snags in various hubs of the movement from antipathy to the term itself to the hyped hatred of feminism s imperfect spokespeople and showed that these snags had not imperiled the feminist cause the book went on to inspire a new generation of readers and has become a classic of contemporary feminist literature in the decades since manifesta was published the world has changed in ways both promising and terrifying this twentieth anniversary edition of manifesta features an updated bibliography timeline and resources as well as a new introduction by the authors expertly unpacking both early women s history and the third wave feminism that seeded the active righteous intersectionality we see today manifesta remains an urgent and necessary tool to make sense of our past present and future

american women look at french women as having it all sex motherhood work and public office while french women look at american women as puritanical excessively feminist and unable to have it all without guilt the essays in this book by leading american and french academics and critics set the record straight by assessing the truth of each outlook they conclude that facts are different from imagination and that on many issues french feminists could actually look to the u s for inspiration this book offers the first comparative critical appraisal of how women live in the us and in france and suggests paths of reflection on what women can do to improve their lives in the twenty first century this is a must read for anyone interested in the nature of womanhood today in the western world

a study of the key areas of issue and debate in feminist media studies this book explores the changing and often ambivalent relationship between the three terms women feminism and media in the light of these debates it places them within the broader discussions within feminist theory of which they have formed a crucial part

this book examines evolving pop culture representations of sex and relationships from the 1970s onwards to demonstrate parallels between the strength of the feminist movement and positive portrayals of women s sexuality in charting changes in the sex and relationship content of women s magazines over time this analysis reveals that despite surface level changes in sexual and relationship content the underlying paradigm of hetero monogamy remains unchanged despite a seemingly more diverse empowered and liberated sexuality for women in contemporary magazines in reality such feminist rhetoric masks an enduring model of sexuality which rests on women s sexual and emotional maintenance of male partners and their own self objectification and self surveillance where substantive changes can be identified they rise and fall in tandem with feminism by demonstrating this empirical relationship between cultural products and feminist organising the book validates an assumption that has rarely been tested that a feminist social milieu improves cultural narratives about sexuality for women sex feminism and lesbian desire builds on ground breaking feminist texts such as susan faludi s backlash to present an empirically focused comprehensive study interrogating changes in content over the lifetime of women s magazines by charting the representation of sex and relationships in two women s magazines cosmopolitan and cleo since the 1970s through an analysis of over 6 500 magazine pages and 1 500 articles this timely work interrogates and ultimately complicates the apparent linear progression of feminism this book is suitable for researchers and students in women s and gender studies queer studies lgbt studies media studies cultural studies and sociology

writing about changes in the notion of womanhood denise riley examines in the manner of foucault shifting historical constructions of the category of women in relation to other categories central to concepts of personhood the soul the mind the body nature the social feminist movements riley argues have had no choice but to play out this indeterminacy of women this is made plain in their oscillations since the 1790s between concepts of equality and of difference to fully recognize the ambiguity of the category of women is she contends a necessary condition for an effective feminist political philosophy

knowing women explores some of the most exciting and new developments in feminist theory engaging the reader as an active participant in critical debates concerning the status of women as both objects and subjects of knowledge the book introduces and reappraises key feminist questions concerning sex and gender biology and the body sexuality and motherhood various

psychoanalytical perspectives are critically examined for the light they throw on the social and symbolic constructions of femininity later chapters explore theories of the subject and subjectivity the place of language in the construction of social identities and the relation between discourse power and knowledge a concluding chapter focuses on the debate between feminism and post modernism stressing the political nature of the feminist project the debates are presented in a way that will make them accessible to students introductions to each chapter lay out the main issues and introduce readings chosen for their clarity and accessibility ideal as an introductory textbook in feminism and women s studies knowing women will also appeal to a wide readership interested in current debates in feminist theory

starting with the late eighteenth century this book explores the history of feminism within a range of countries spanning several continents the use of a broad comparative approach highlights the varieties of feminism and the different political and social contexts in which they have developed hannam identifies broad trends and changes over time and introduces recent interpretations and approaches key themes include the challenge made by feminists to prevailing ideas about a woman s place the notions of sisterhood and solidarity and the relationship between feminism and other social and political reform movements including nationalist struggles socialist politics and anti colonial movements feminism is suitable for undergraduate students studying feminism as part of a history politics or sociology course

though all women are women no woman is only a woman wrote elizabeth spelman in the inessential woman gone are the days when feminism translated simply into the advocacy of equality for women women s interests are not always aligned race class and sexuality complicate the equation in recent years feminist ideologies have become increasingly diverse today one feminist s most ardent political opponent may well be another feminist as feminism grows increasingly diverse the time has come to ask a painful and frequently avoided question what does it mean for women to oppress women this pathbreaking provocative anthology addresses this troublesome dilemma from various feminist perspectives offering an interdisciplinary collection of writings that widens our understanding of oppression to take into account women who are at odds the book examines the social political and psychological ramifications of this phenomenon as evidenced in a range of texts from women s antislavery writing to women s anti abortion writing from mother daughter incest stories to maternal surrogacy narratives from the bible to the popular romance nove from jane austen to alice walker the value of the volume is perhaps best summed up by an early response to the idea this is a book that should never be written feminists should concentrate on how men oppress women ironically it is precisely because the subject triggers such responses the authors argue that a volume such as feminist nightmares has become a necessity

wave feminists who fought for women suffrage as well as for reforms in family life wage work and educational opportunities a more economically independent group of second wave feminists were concerned primarily with women's political activism reproductive rights child care provision for wage earning women laws against rape and sexual harassment and consciousness raising about women's oppression throughout her consideration of these issues Lovenduski remains keenly aware of the unique situation for the women in each country discussed as well as the divisions created among women due to differing social class and ethnic background she is also skeptical of official press reports and accounts of women's political activity and aware of the interplay between professed government ideology and actual social and political practices as they affect women's daily lives

contrary to popular perceptions newly veiled women across the middle east are just as much products and symbols of modernity as the upper and middle class women who courageously took off the veil almost a century ago to make this point these essays focus on the woman question in the middle east most particularly in Egypt and Iran especially at the turn of the century when gender became a highly charged nationalist issue tied up in complex ways with the west the last two decades have witnessed an extraordinary burst of energy and richness in middle east women's studies and the contributors to this volume exemplify the vitality of this new thinking they take up issues of concern to historians and social thinkers working on the postcolonial world the essays challenge the assumptions of other major works on women and feminism in the middle east by questioning among other things the familiar dichotomy in which women's domesticity is associated with tradition and modernity with their entry into the public sphere indeed remaking women is a radical challenge to any easy equation of modernity with progress emancipation and the empowerment of women the contributors are Lila Abu-Lughod Marilyn Booth Deniz Kandiyoti Khaled Fahmy Mervat Hatem Afsaneh Najmabadi Omnia Shakry and Zohreh T. Sullivan the book is introduced by the editor with a piece called *Feminist Longings and Postcolonial Conditions* which masterfully interfaces the critical studies of feminism and modernism with scholarship on south Asia and the middle east

this book illustrates a distinctive lineage of critical interventions in moving image culture and in the public sphere through the trajectories of a small number of film and video organizations established between the 1970s and the early 1980s in western Europe and North America mainly by women and still operative today the six case studies examined *Drac Mâgic Women Make Movies* *Groupe Intervention Vidéo* *Leeds Animation Workshop* *Bildwechsel Centre Audiovisuel* *Simone de Beauvoir* have maintained a discrete yet continuing presence within an audiovisual industry and a cultural system dominated by institutionalized and corporate forms of production and distribution their longevity quite a rarity in the independent circuit makes a strong case for the sustainability of feminist LGBTQ media activism in the public sphere in spite of its low key profile this volume will be of interest to

academicians of history and communication studies feminist and lgbtq topics and gender related cinematic culture

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
